WORDING FOR AGENDA ITEM: Approval to Poll Woodbury County Employees and Spouses Concerning Wellness Scans

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: That the Human Resources Department and Budget Analyst poll (by way of e-mail or other communication) all county employees concerning a cost of \$50 for all three screens given by Mercy (reduced from \$99) and that the *potential* exists that this could be reduced by \$25 through those in a matching county contribution for those in a high-risk category, over the age 40. This was requested in discussion during the March 17 meeting and is brought back as an action item only to gather information.

BACKGROUND: Claims are at approximately \$4.5 million in the current fiscal year. In order to mitigate increased insurance claims, the Health and Wellness Committee heard a presentation that Mercy is offering on-site testing and the impact of <u>one</u> preventative test identifying a serious aortic aneurism could prevent claims costs, not to mention the impact on the physical and emotional well-being of an employee or spouse covered by county health insurance who might otherwise experience a catastrophic health event.

FINANCIAL IMPACT: The financial impact will be predicated upon the number of employees taking advantage of non-invasive and painless tests to include Stroke and Artery Screening, Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm Screening, and Peripheral Arterial Disease Screening. Given the preventative nature of claims, the fiscal impact could potentially be off-set by no time lost at work and a minor cost rather than an exorbitant claim later on. Nothing in this motion obligates the Board to act in such a way as to incur fiscal impact; rather this is information-gathering in order for the Board to help make a decision.

RECOMMENDATION: In order to discern the costs, the recommendation is to poll employees to see if they would take advantage of such a screening and then have the Budget Analyst and Human Resources come back to the Board by April 7 with a fiscal impact should the Board decide to contribute to this preventative screening.

RECOMMENDATION: That all contracts be physically housed, filed, and available within the Auditor's office as well as placed on the County website in order for the public to be able to access them.





- County Administrator has 36 years experience in 3 local governments;
- Assistant County Administrator has 28 years experience in local governments.

Permanence

- Future County Administrators are groomed by the current one, and the International City/County Management Association (ICMA) Liaison Program.
- > Employment agreement, like 89% of county administrators (Source: 2014 ICMA CAO Salary and Compensation Survey).

Keep in mind...

If we model our position after the <u>Assistant Administrator</u>, we must first acknowledge <u>the roles and</u> philosophy of the Administrator are duplicated in the Assistant.

Roles of the Scott County Administrator

Leadership comes from Administrator

- "I push the Board to make decisions."
- Agenda review before each bi-weekly meeting

Planning & Operations

- 3-year budget planned by Administrator
- Uses budget director as a sounding board

Represents the Board to other governments

- Liaison to cities and department heads
- Sends a lobbyist to the state legislature

Philosophy of the Scott County Administrator

After 27 years as city manager to Davenport, the greatest frustration as county administrator for 9 years is dealing with elected department heads, it's

"hard to get them in the boat."

Treasurers should be combined with Auditors and Recorders.

Differences with Supervisors are not contentious, but "philosophical."

Advocates for a single tax levy and merging budgets with the city.

Former President of IaCMA, advises Woodbury to conduct a nationwide search through ICMA.

What does Scott County's form of government represent?

My starting assumption echoed the March 17th claim:

"A Balance Between Strong Manager Style and the Traditional Board"

However:

- Scott County is also an outlier, in terms of administration staff and budget/finance staff.
- All proposed training goals with exception of budget are already under the purview of the HR Director and this Board will encourage, support, and enforce them all.
- ▶I did indeed campaign on, and was elected to exercise performance-based budgeting, so I'll do it with the invaluable advice of our experienced team of advisors. The expertise for budget/finance and personnel organization is split between two people precisely because Supervisors must balance them.

My current understanding:

We already have the true, balanced, hybrid system. It's the one 97 of 99 lowa counties retain: The Commissioner/Supervisor system. The law's intent (previous slide) is for the **electorate** to petition for a change of government if they want to adopt either extreme—an "Elected Executive" (Strong Mayor) or a "Board-Manager" (Parliamentary).

The continued search for a fair comparison— Johnson County (pop. 140,000)

It's been suggested their "Executive Assistant (to the Board): \$93,069 (FY 15)" may be another model to emulate as we seek a "hybrid/weak" county administrator-----(applies also to Linn County).

My conversations with their Vice-Chair & Executive Assistant revealed the following:

- Their Exec. Asst. is often mistaken as a manager because of the salary, but they are not and do not oversee other departments. The position is paid extra to lobby state government, and coordinate special projects not assigned to department heads (fleet management, centralized purchasing, etc).
- ➤ Board's Exec. Asst. & HR Director are both very proactive in communication and shared tasks. "This relationship is critical for smooth management of government and implementation of the Board's wishes."
- They do not have a County Administrator, but also advise against combining an Administrator with any department head.

Johnson County's Alternative to County Administrator Began with our same main concern:

"We have 400 employees. Someone needs to be available all day, every day, to address county business." -Chairman Monson.

"The duties and will of the Board can be carried out to a greater degree and with more efficiency and fidelity." –Vice-Chairman Taylor

- Two liaisons for not only every department, but every small city and school district.
- Junior paired up with senior; liaisons serve 2 years on the same committee; seniors rotated out.
- Much more extended updates AND discussion on "committee report-backs", before or after main agenda.
- After Johnson County public sentiment decided against a County Administrator, the public reached consensus that Supervisors would not remain part-time or go full-time, but commit to "3/4ths time."
- At least one Supervisor is in the courthouse every day.
- The Board acts as a referee when departments disagree with HR Director or vice versa, but this became much rarer with the above implementation. Board majority maintains right to reassign liaisons.

> I recommend our Board adopt a similar practice by the January 2016 organizational meeting.

Conclusions

- ✓ Cities tend to Council-Manager form because emphasis on efficiency serves best a homogenous population. Counties tend to Commissioners form because emphasis on responsiveness serves best a diverse population. Woodbury's rural residents want Board representation, not a county manager. I have heard this firsthand.
- ✓ While assumed to "take the politics out of it," the very idea of a county manager was a
 political one—aimed at mitigating corruption among elected officials. Media coverage and
 citizen involvement was and is the remedy.
- ✓ In the words of Polk County's application: "The County Administrator position receives its operational authority from the Board, and the amount and extent of that authority has evolved and increased over the past ten years." The same is true of Scott County, and the same would be true of Woodbury County.

Conclusions (cont.)

- ✓ The County Administrator comparison to a "CEO in the private sector" is invalid. How many CEO's do you know that get involved in daily oversight? The County Administrator is not the CEO; the Board of Supervisors is the CEO. We have 5 CEO's in Woodbury County simply because 1 would be a king.
- ✓ The Board-Manager from carries the romantic notion that all power is concentrated in the
 elected whole, which deals with higher matters like policy, while the Manager produces the end
 result under the constant oversight of the Board which can remove them at any time. But whose
 "constant" oversight is really "constant", and whose oversight leads to more institutionalized
 power in the long-term? Knowledge is power, is it not?
- √"A County Manager" is a popular campaign issue because it appears selfless and is itself a
 criticism of the incumbency.
- ✓ That said, while in office, virtually no one has told me they hope it's the next thing we do.

Final Conclusion

- As counties get bigger, the Supervisors simply transition from part-time to full-time as warranted. The Chairman's role also becomes extremely varied in scope, power, and practice.
- ❖I believe representative government (think Congress) incurs its lowest approval ratings not because they exercise too much power, but because they abdicate too much, whether to other governments or to unelected bureaucrats, giving the people the feeling they don't control their government.

I cannot support a County Administrator, not because of short-term concerns, but because of long-term repercussions to the influence of the voters, and Woodbury County's own troubled history with administrators.


Board Chairman, Mark Monson and County Finance/Operations Controller, Dennis Butler met with the City Finance Director, Donna Forker and Assistant City Manager, Mike Collett. Several items were discussed that could provide more efficiency and potential cost savings to the taxpayer.

The following is a list of items discussed:

- The City will be providing a list of their service agreements to review, in hopes that some meet the needs of Woodbury County. The County Attorney's office would review & make any recommendations.
- The County is in the process of gathering a list of garbage pick-up sites. During the month of April, the City will bid out the contract that will include the City & County. An increase in volume could result in cost savings.
- 3) There was discussion regarding the purchase of copy paper. Each entity will check with their departments on the amount & what type of paper is being used. The County & City would bid out the paper in May.

- 4) Contracts for elevator maintenance was discussed & the possibility of a combined bidding process to achieve maximum savings.
- 5) The County will be working with Building Services about our janitorial supplies, such as our volume. This is another possibility of joint purchasing with the City, to buy in bulk and save money.
- 6) Ambulance service will be bid out in the next couple weeks. The County has budgeted \$48,000 in FY 2016. Currently Siouxland Paramedics is the current provider.
- 7) Travel Policy was also discussed. This involves a change in reimbursement on travel expenses. Per diem was also discussed.

LHA Mission

The Loess Hills Alliance strives to protect special natural and cultural resources while ensuring the economic viability and private property rights of the region through the creation of a common vision for Iowa's Loess Hills.

The Loess Hills Alliance is made up of a 28 member Board of Directors from all 7 counties in the Loess Hills. Then there is a 7 member Executive Committee which manages the day to day business of the Alliance and 3 working committees that are Stewardship, Protection and Economic Development.

This past year's achievements are listed below from the committees:

Executive Committee

The Loess Hills Alliance Executive Board ensures that the funds appropriated from state funding are used wisely. The most successful use of those funds has included partnering with other organizations such as Pheasants Forever, local NRCS offices, and Iowa Natural Heritage Foundation as well as farmers and private land owners to leverage the dollars for the best possible mutually beneficial outcome within the Loess Hills. The funds were used as follows:

- \$96,000 was allocated equally to the three standing committees Economic Development, Protection, and Stewardship which was \$32,000 for each committee.
- \$15,000 was made available for administrative purposes such as board meetings and secretarial expenses.

In August 2012, the Loess Hills Alliance received a bequeath from the Shirley Vannorsdel Estate, the amount given of \$280,739.05 had to be used for projects in Plymouth County. Plymouth County Conservation Board received \$80,000 towards equipment to protect the Loess Hills acres and landowners received funding to work on their properties for stewardship activities of approximately 183 acres for \$41,023. Land Protection for \$159.716 for TNC to expand their Broken Kettle Grassland Locations and accesses. Donations such as these show genuine support of the Loess Hills Alliance from local residents.

In 2013 the Executive Committee, with a vote of the full Board of Directors, began exploring the feasibility of a National Reserve designation for the Loess Hills Region with the National Parks Service. The Executive Committee hired Michelle Walker part time to help facilitate this project with a subcommittee of volunteers.

- Beginning in January 2014 the Executive Board began hosting a series of public meetings in each county within
 the region to disseminate information and receive input and recommendations of the general public.
- Ultimately the Full Board voted to pursue other opportunities within the Loess Hills rather than a National Reserve Designation.
- Much information was gathered through this process and will be invaluable to the Alliance for future focus and direction of our organization.
- This information has led the Executive Board to return to a grass roots effort of support for the public and landowners within the Loess Hills. The full Board of Directors voted to discontinue pursuit of the National Reserve designation due to public input.
- The Executive Board has continued and will continue to seek valuable input and direction from both the public
 and Full Board Members. The Loess Hills Alliance seeks to offer unique, collaborative leadership and address
 gaps in services to comprehensively protect the Loess Hills, which no other organization currently provides.

The Loess Hills Alliance Executive Board works continuously to ensure the work of all the Loess Hills Alliance committees falls within the parameters of our mission statement which is: To protect the natural and cultural resources of the Loess Hills while ensuring economic viability and private property rights through the creation of a common vision for Iowa's Loess Hills. All efforts of the Loess Hills Alliance work hand in hand with the Comprehensive Plan and Legislative Responsibilities.

Protection Committee:

The Protection Committee approved the amount of \$38,000 to be offered for grants this fiscal year. Listed here are projects funded by the *Protection Committee* of the LHA from FY 2014.

2014 RFP Funded Projects

- The Nature Conservancy: \$30,000 towards an 18.4 acre acquisition in Pottawattamie County within the Folsom Point SLA.
- Iowa Natural Heritage Foundation: \$15,000 toward 152 acre acquisition in Monona County within the Turin SLA.

**The Executive Committee contributed the additional \$7,000 to fully fund both projects. **

Stewardship Committee

Field Days

The Stewardship Committee held 3 well publicized field days this spring and summer to increase opportunities for the public to learn more about our mission and activities and to socialize with LHA members. Field days were held on different days of the week and at different times to reach the broadest audience possible. In total, 24 people attended. The organization and its partners have helped put fire on the ground in the hills on 4,000+ acres with a goal of reaching 10,000 acres someday to do ecological restoration.

Private Lands Positions

The Loess Hills Alliance continues to provide support for 3 private lands positions, in partnership with the Iowa DNR, Soil and Water Conservation Districts, National and local Pheasants Forever and the Natural Resources Conservation Service. These positions are providing outreach and technical assistance to private landowners on conservation planning and implementation. 120 Landowner Contacts, Nearly 1,500 acres of Loess Hills Habitat plans written,

America's Great Outdoors (AGO) Initiative

This program was setup to develop a 21st Century conservation and recreation agenda. AGO takes as its premise that lasting conservation solutions should come from the American people - that the protection of our natural heritage is a non-partisan objective that is shared by all Americans. Project funds were used in Fremont, Mills, Harrison, Monona and Plymouth Counties. 15 projects completed for 320 acres tree shearing with another 550 acres enhanced, \$82,000 of AGO funds. An additional \$68,000 has been obligated on an additional 310 acres yet to be completed

Economic Development Committee

MISSION

The Economic Development Committee worked this year to meet the goals set forth in our mission. It is our endeavor to enhance the economy of the Loess Hills region by:

- *Providing assistance and being a resource for small businesses and community attractions as decided by committee members.
- *Increasing visitor traffic at recreation facilities, events and area attractions.
- *Offering education and technical assistance to business and government agencies.

The committee consists of representatives from economic development, conservation, recreation, convention and visitors bureaus, elected officials on local and federal levels, and small businesses and tourist attractions. The committee meets quarterly.

The economic development committee worked this past year on Advertising to nearly 1 million households in 6 states, this included; guidebook printing, tear off maps, brochures all of which are found at visitor centers and tourism locations throughout the Loess Hills Region.



One of the main efforts of this committee is the re-introduc-

committee is the re-introduction of prescribed fire as an important tool for natural area management. This creates a natural process of disturbance, allowing the prairie to thrive, preventing forest overgrowth on the prairie, and controlling invasive undergrowth within the forest. These controlled burns compensate for the lack of fire on the landscape and the lack of natural grazers no longer grazing on the native grasslands. Historically, bison and elk migrated throughout the Loess Hills. Grazing today is concentrated on smaller pastures and is grazed differently than the native grazers.


